<u>Go Deeper, 21st January 2023</u> <u>Abundance</u>



Dear Miners,

When Jesus began his ministry with the miracle at the wedding in Cana, he turned scarcity into abundance, despair into joy and shame into respect. There was a lot more being transformed that day than "just" water into wine.

I noted on Sunday how Jesus didn't do this miracle alone. He involved the (probably exhausted!) servants at the feast, getting them to draw water enough to fill six enormous jars into wine. It would have taken a lot of effort, but the result must have made it so worthwhile and such good fun. Imagine 908 bottles of wine...because that would be roughly what Jesus provided!

I likened us to the servants, our money to the water, the churches in Leeds Diocese to the empty jars and the wine to all the amazing stuff that God does with what we offer.

When we read about the beginnings of the church in the book of Acts, we are told stories of similarly generous ways of living and giving and sharing so that no one was in need. Writing materials were expensive and difficult to use at that time, so the writer would have selected the most unusual or outstanding stories and events that they could – the important and inspiring stuff. When you read about the new Christians in Acts 4: 32-36 sharing their money and resources and it sounds unusually challenging and makes you think - that's exactly why it was included.
